

Equipment Update



What else can we say as a board other than THANK YOU!!! When we started this foundation and officially launched on February 3rd, we hoped we would have tremendous support from our alumni and businesses with Central ties. Well, we have indeed had tremendous support. To date we have received over \$17,000 in donations which has allowed us to get the following done:

- Donate \$1,000 for the football team to go to the UND team camp
- Award three \$500 scholarships to graduating seniors
- Order the Trap Chute that is shown in the picture (\$5,700)



We are very close to being able to accomplish these next tasks to help the program:

- Purchase a new 5-man blocking sled (\$6,700)
- Provide meals for the teams at each level after games this upcoming season which costs roughly \$300 after each road game
- Make sure any player that needs financial assistance to pay for cleats, gloves, etc. can get the items through the foundation

Origin of The GFC Helmet Logo

When Coach Berg was named as Central's head football coach for the 1979 season, he hired Randy Wilson, a GFC alum and former player at North Dakota State School of Science and UND, as quarterback coach. After that first season, Randy, who had his degree in art and special education, created a manual for the QB's. It included coaching points drills, and a number of diagrams and images of proper techniques, etc. Many of the designs were hand drawn and actually screen printed on heavy paper.

The cover page included the GFC helmet – an original design created by Coach Wilson. It was unique and the letters themselves were a great fit for the helmet shape. The design was immediately adopted, and numerous discussions were held about how to best use it. The school nickname at the time was Redskins, and "Skins" was the decal on the helmets (an original is on display in the gymnasium lobby). The helmet design was used on

apparel, hats, and items such as stationary and notebooks. It became our "official" football team identity.

When the school district dropped the Redskin nickname, the interlocking GF was applied to both sides of the helmets for one season. A decision was made after that season to use the unique and well identified GFC design on only one side of the helmet. The design was used from 1994 until 2022, when a decision was made to return to the interlocking GF as a standard for all Central athletic teams.

The Leather Helmet A Letter from Coach Ron Bergh

The game of football goes back in time to the 1870"s. Some of us old guys that played for GFC back in the day have often been asked when we play for Central. I will often reply jokingly, "back in the leather helmet days" when you could fold your helmet together and carry it in your pocket! Although that is not true I'm surprised by how close I was to playing in that era. I started playing tackle football at Valley Jr in the fall of 1957. Plastic helmets were not even invented until the early 40"s. The first plastic helmet was invented by John T. Riddell. Interesting enough it wasn't until 1943 that the NFL instituted a rule requiring ALL players to even wear helmets!



In 1949, The NFL officially adopted the plastic helmet. Without going back and checking yearbooks, I would guess that GFC football players were still wearing leather helmets into the mid to late 40's, if not longer.

What is the point of all this football helmet history? In the fall of 1972, I was selected to be the head football coach at GFC. It was my first job after graduating from UND and then spending three years in the Army. At that time, the GFC football locker rooms and practice fields were located at Valley Junior High School. When I first opened up the equipment storage room to inventory everything, I found stashed, over in a corner, boxes of old leather helmets. Yes, quite literally the ones you could squeeze together and carry in your pocket! Just how many were there I don't remember but there were several boxes. Some of the helmets had pigmentation of maroon and gray in the leather.

The Leather Helmet (Cont.)

Just recently I started looking on eBay for the value of leather helmets used back in the day. The leather helmet days actually go back into the 1890's with a wide variety of different types used through the decades. Today's value of leather helmets also varies on eBay but many are listed for \$150 to \$500. A MacGregor Authentic H612 used by the University of Michigan in the 1940"s sells for almost \$900.

Yes, those GFC leather helmets are probably worth a small fortune in today's market If donated to the GFC "Yes We Can" Foundation they would provide a nice little money maker! The obvious question is what did I do with these old leather helmets when I first discovered them in our equipment room? Well, I must confess that in order to make room for new equipment and needing additional storage space, I shitcanned those leather helmets! If I had only known! But my mom back in the late 1960's threw away my baseball cards which included a 1952 Mickey Mantle rookie card. If she had only known!

Weight Room

Every off-season seems to look a little different. The focus of this off-season for our football team has been consistency and accessibility.
